Day 1: Islamic Art Project

Activity:

Create a Ramadan themed art project using various materials such as paint, coloured pencils, or markers. Have them create Islamic-themed art and crafts such as masjid models, a crescent moon Islamic calligraphy, or Islamic geometric patterns.







Day 3: Ramadan Scavenger Hunt

Activity:

Children will search for and collect items around the house or madrasa that are related to Ramadan, such as dates, prayer beads, or a Quran. Once they have found all the items, they will complete a quiz or activity to test their knowledge of the items they found.





Day 4: Make Your Own Fast-Breaking Meal

Activity:

Children will work in groups to plan, prepare and present a healthy fast-breaking meal. They will learn about the importance of nutrition during Ramadan and the significance of breaking the fast with dates and water.



Children will learn about the importance of charity during Ramadan and will participate in various acts of kindness and charity. This could include making cards for the elderly, visiting a local soup kitchen, or donating clothes to a charity.







Day 6: Islamic Storytelling

Activity:

Children will listen to a story from Islamic
literature or Hadith collection, such as a story
about Prophet Muhammad or a Sahaba. Have the
children gather in a circle and take turns telling
Islamic stories from the Quran or Hadith.
Encourage the children to use their imagination


and creativity while telling the stories.



Day 7: Ramadan Memory Game

Activity:

Children will play a memory game using
Ramadan-related words and pictures, such as
"prayer" or "fasting." They will match the words
and pictures to learn new vocabulary and
concepts related to Ramadan.







Day 8: Ramadan Cooking Class

Activity:

Children will learn how to make a traditional Ramadan dish, such as samosas or dates filled with nut butter. They will learn about the cultural significance of the dish and the importance of breaking the fast with dates.





Day 9: Islamic Geography

Activity:

Children will learn about the geography of Islamic countries and the location of important Islamic landmarks, such as Mecca and Medina. They will create a map or a collage of these landmarks.







Day 10: Salah/Prayer Reflection

Activity:

Children will reflect on their own prayer practices and make a plan to improve their Salah during the month of Ramadan.



Day 11: Ramadan Journal

Activity:

Children will create a journal to document their experiences during Ramadan. They will reflect on their fasting, prayer, and acts of charity, and write about any challenges or successes they encounter.







Day 12: Zakat Calculator

Activity:

Children will learn about the Islamic obligation of Zakat (charity) and use a zakat calculator to determine how much they should give based on their savings. They will then donate the calculated amount to a local charity.



Badr or Aisha bint Abi Bakr. They will create a

timeline or a poster to showcase their learning.







Day 14: Islamic Calligraphy

Activity:

Children will learn about the art of Islamic calligraphy and create their own calligraphy piece using traditional Islamic scripts such as Thuluth or Kufic.

Teach the children the art of Islamic calligraphy and have them practice writing Arabic letters and words. Provide them with calligraphy pens and paper.










Day 16: Ramadan Crafts

Activity:

Children will create Ramadan-themed crafts such as paper lanterns, crescent moon suncatchers, or prayer bead bracelets. They will also learn about the significance of these items in Ramadan.









Day 17: Islamic Finance

Activity:

Children will learn about Islamic finance and the principles of Islamic banking. They will also learn about the concept of Riba (usury) and its prohibition in Islam.











Day 19: Make your own prayer mat

Activity:

Give each child a piece of fabric and some craft materials such as markers, glitter, and glue.

Have the children design and decorate their prayer mat with Islamic symbols and patterns.

Encourage them to use their creativity and imagination while creating their prayer mat.







Activity:

Children will learn about the rituals and significance of the Hajj, the Islamic pilgrimage to Mecca. They will also participate in a Hajj simulation, where they will perform the rituals of Hajj in a symbolic way.











Day 22: Quran Reading Competition

Activity:

Divide the children into groups and have them compete in a Quran reading competition.

Provide each group with a section of the Quran to memorize and recite.









Activity:

Children will learn about the traditional
Ramadan feasts and the significance of
breaking the fast with dates and water.
They will also learn about the etiquette of
inviting others to break the fast and sharing
food.









Activity:

Children will learn about Islamic law and the Five Pillars of Islam. They will also learn about the importance of following the laws of Islam and the consequences of breaking these laws.









Day 29: Last ten nights of Ramadan

Activity:

Children will learn about the significance of the last ten nights of Ramadan and the importance of seeking Laylat al-Qadr (The Night of Power).

They will also learn about the etiquette of performing Taraweeh and other special prayers during these nights.





Activity:

Children will learn about the preparations for Eid al-Fitr, such as cleaning the house, buying new clothes, and making special dishes. They will also learn about the etiquette of Eid, such as visiting family and friends, and giving Eid greetings.



Islamic Trivia Challenge

Divide the children into teams and have them compete against each other in a trivia challenge about Islamic history, Quranic stories, and Islamic teachings.

Use flashcards or a PowerPoint presentation to display the questions. Encourage the children to work together and use their Quranic and Islamic knowledge to answer the questions correctly.

Islamic Quiz Show

Divide the children into teams and have them compete against each other in an Islamic quiz show.

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Use flashcards or a PowerPoint presentation to display the questions.

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Encourage the children to work together and use their Islamic knowledge to answer the questions correctly.

Islamic Debate

Divide the children into teams and have them debate Islamic topics such as the importance of prayer, the status of women in Islam, or the concept of jihad.

Encourage the children to research and prepare their arguments beforehand, and to be respectful of different opinions.

Islamic Game Day

Play Islamic-themed games such as "Islamic Jeopardy" or "Name that Surah".

Encourage the children to use their Islamic knowledge while playing the games.

Islamic Architecture

Activity: Children will learn about the architectural features of Islamic buildings, such as domes and arches. They will also learn about the symbolism and meaning behind these features.
